## **CLEARWATER BOOKS**

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I've come to South Norwood Lakes to look at the Great Crested Grebes. In addition to all the obvious reasons, I'm enamoured of these grebes because, if you invert their heads, we look increasingly alike due to the frankly absurd beard I've grown. The beard (Gemma has taken to calling it 'our beard' which I'm not thrilled about) exists partly as a defence against the winter weather, and partly because it amuses me to try and convince people I meet at gigs that I'm a founding member of Napalm Death. No takers so far, but I persevere.

To the west of Norwood Lakes runs Auckland Road whose most notable resident was Raymond Chandler. Chandler's mother lived on Devonshire Road, some doors down from our old flat, and R.C. lived there too for some years. It increasingly feels as if I'm stalking his ghost around South London. The second most notable resident of Auckland Road (and it's a bit of a drop between first and second place) was one Stephen Clarke, my dad, who lived here in a house-share in the late 1960s. I'm not sure which number he lived at or whether he was aware of his illustrious one-time neighbour as the blue plaque surely post-dates his residence.

The area around Norwood Lakes is also home to the Norwood Exiles Cricket Club and I've made a note to drop them a line to see if there's an opening in their ranks for somebody who can bowl 30mph donkey drops *almost* at will.

The drive home takes me over The Goat Bridge (I've no notion why it's called that) and past the unimaginatively named Sensible Gardens, which is surely one of the saddest little green spaces in the capital. I then pass the house of William Walker, the celebrated diver whose work saved Winchester Cathedral from collapse (I understand Walker cycled home from Winchester every Friday evening for a good chunk of the six years he spent on the project, and I feel a small pang of guilt to be *driving* past his house this morning).

I arrive home just in time to take delivery of several sheets of Perspex, ordered to replace the shed windows which Storm Henk blew out last weekend. An hour later, several new windows are in situ – these so much cleaner than the few which survived the storm that every time I admire my handywork I think they've fallen out again – which surely they will very, very soon...

- 1. **ABBEY THEATRE. Lennox Robinson**. *Ireland's Abbey Theatre*. A History 1899-1951. Compiled by Lennox Robinson. Sidgwick & Jackson 1951. First edition. **Anglo-Irish poet Richard Murphy's copy**, with his inked signature to the front free endpaper. 8vo. xiv, 224pp. With a photographic frontispiece and 29 plates of photographs and portraits. The top edge spotted, and the free endpapers very lightly toned. A very good copy in dust wrapper, with some toning to the spine panel and some rubbing and light wear to the upper edge. An important history of the Abbey Theatre, penned by its one-time manager and published the same year it was gutted by fire (although at the fire's outbreak this history was already in the press). £40
- 2. **JOHN ABERCROMBIE**. The Gardener's Pocket Journal, and Daily Assistant in the Modern Practice of English Gardening. In a Concise Monthly Display of all the Practical Works of General Gardening, Throughout the Year. B.Crosby & Co. 1804. Eighth edition, corrected and enlarged, with a new preface by the author plus a Complete Description of the Implements of Gardening, not included in any prior edition. 8vo. [ii], 366pp. Bound in half-calf with marbled paper-covered sides, with raised bands and gilt lettering and rules. Some soiling and spotting to the edges, and the engraved frontispiece carefully secured with cloth tape. Some damp marking to the lower margins of the perhaps half of the text leaves. A nice bright copy. £95
- 3. **ERIC AMBLER.** The Army of the Shadows. A story. Knaves Press [no place], 2001. The first separate edition of this Ambler short story, set just before the start of the Second World War (it was originally printed in 1939 in *The Queen's Book of the Red Cross*). 8vo. 12pp. Stapled card wrappers. In fine state. £10
- 4. ANTHOLOGY (Peter Fleming, W.Stanley Moss, Xan Fielding, Christopher Sykes &c.). Special Operations. Edited with an introduction by Patrick Howarth. Routledge & Kegan Paul 1955. First edition. 8vo. xiv, 239pp. Illustrated with photographs of the contributors. Binding a fraction tender at one gathering, and with just a trace of very light spotting to the edges and endpapers. Very good indeed in lightly rubbed and spotted pictorial dust wrapper, with a single short closed edge-tear. Reminiscences by members of the S.O.E. including Peter Fleming ("a hilarious but highly dangerous attempt to dive a train carrying many trucks of high explosive south from Larissa, Greece, during a withdrawal under heavy German pressure in April, 1941"), W.Stanley Moss, Julian Amery, Peter Churchill, Bruce Marshall, F.Spencer Chapman &c. Most of these articles have been extracted from books; the contributions by Peter Fleming and Francis Noel-Baker were originally talks on the B.B.C. £35
- 5. **ANTHOLOGY**. *Georgian Poetry 1911-1912*. Edited with a brief preparatory note by E[dward] M[arsh]. The Poetry Bookshop 1923. The deluxe issue, printed on handmade watermarked paper, limited to 250 copies and bound in full brown buckram. Top edge gilt, others untrimmed. 8vo. 199pp. Some light partial toning to the rear free endpaper. A virtually fine copy in the uncommon dust wrapper, toned at the spine panel and lightly rubbed at the upper and lower edges. A small sticker covering the original price printed to the spine panel has been partially removed. A hefty selection of verse by Lascelles Abercrombie, Gordon Bottomley, Rupert Brooke, G.K.Chesterton, W.H.Davies, Walter de la Mare, John Drinkwater, J.L.Flecker, W.W.Gibson, D.H.Lawrence, John Masefield, James Stephens and others. Originally published in 1912 this deluxe issue was produced in a uniform set with *Georgian Poetry* numbers 1-4, all published in 1923 and each volume limited to 250 copies. Woolmer A1b. £200
- 6. **ISAAC ASIMOV**. *More Tales of the Black Widowers*. Victor Gollancz 1977. First UK edition. 8vo. 180pp. Top- and fore edge lightly spotted, and with a touch of toning to the paperstock. An area of unsightly creasing to the head of the rear endpaper. A very good copy in virtually fine dust wrapper. A follow up to the author's 1974 collection *Tales of Black Widowers*; twelve more mystery stories (nine reprinted from various periodicals and three hitherto unprinted), featuring his fictional club of mystery solvers, the Black Widowers (which is based on the New Your City literary dining club Trap Door Spiders to which Asimov belonged). £35

- 7. **DIANA ATHILL**. *Stet. A Memoir*. Granta Books 2000. First edition. This copy **signed by the author** on the title page. 8vo. 250pp. A fine copy in fractionally dust soiled dust wrapper. A memoir of the author's five-decade career as a literary editor ("*she nursed, and coerced and coaxed*"), with chapters on Mordecai Richler and Brian Moore, Jean Rhys, Alfred Chester, V.S.Naipaul and Molly Keane. £40
- 8. **PAUL AUSTER**. *Unearth*. Poems. Living Hand 3, Connecticut 1974. First edition of the author's first book, issued here as the third number of the occasional periodical *Living Hand*, printed at The Compton Press, Wiltshire and "published several times a year". Slim 8vo. Unpaginated. Lettered card wrappers, lightly faded at the spine and with a narrow strip of very faint toning to the fore edge margin of the upper wrapper, yet still considerably fresher than is usually found. This copy **inscribed** in pencil at the head of the first leaf by the printer Humphrey [Stone] to his brother-in-law Jonathan [Gili]. Very good indeed. Thirty-three poems, the author's first book, preceded only be a couple of translations from the French. £200
- 9. **PAUL AUSTER**. *The Red Notebook and Other Writings*. Faber 1995. First edition. 8vo. 159pp. Some toning to the paperstock, as is common with Faber productions of this period, else a fine copy in virtually fine dust wrapper. A new edition of *The Art of Hunger* (1992), plus one new essay, *A Prayer for Salman Rushdie*, which appears here in bookform for the first time. £25
- 10. **H.E.BATES** contributes his story *The Evolution of Saxby* to an issue of the periodical *Lilliput*. Vol. 32, no. 2, issue no. 188. January-February 1953. First edition. Slim 8vo. 96pp. Card wrappers, fractionally soiled and with a touch of marking from the rusted internal staples to the edge of the rear wrapper. Former owner name neatly pencilled to the head of the rear wrapper. A very good copy. The first appearance in print of this sixteen-page Bates story, which was subsequently collected *in The Daffodil Sky* (1955). Eads B202.1. £15
- 11. **SAMUEL BECKETT**. Samuel Beckett: An Exhibition. The catalogue of a May-July 1971 exhibition at Reading University Library (and subsequent tour), compiled by James Knowlson. Turret Books 1971. First edition, the card wrapper issue. 8vo. 123pp. Glossy card wrappers. Illustrated with eight photographs and manuscript reproductions. Top edge spotted, a trace of dust soiling to the wrappers, and a single light but lengthy readership crease to the spine. A very good copy of this 385-item catalogue which surveys the whole life of the Nobel Laureate. £15
- 12. **SAMUEL BECKETT**. *Dream of Fair to Middling Women*. Edited by Eoin O'Brien and Edith Fournier, and with a foreword by Eoin O'Brien. The Black Cat Press, Dublin 1992. First edition. 8vo. xvii, 241pp. Top edge spotted and with a little further spotting to the free endpapers and to a dozen preliminary leaves. Very good in slightly marked and scored dust wrapper, with a touch of internal spotting. Beckett's first novel, written in the Trianon Hotel, Paris during the summer of 1932 when he was twenty-six years old and unpublished for sixty years. £15
- 13. **SIR THOMAS BEECHAM**. *Frederick Delius*. A biography. Hutchinson 1959. First edition. This copy boldly **signed by Thomas Beecham** on the front free endpaper. 8vo. 228pp. With a frontispiece drawing of Delius by James Gunn and 16 photographs and reproductions. Edges quite lightly spotted, and with a little further spotting to the free endpapers, and to two or three preliminary and concluding leaves. A very good copy in dust wrapper, rubbed and creased at the spine panel ends with several tiny fractions of loss and some internal repair, and with a little light dust soiling and edgewear. Pencilled ownership details of Deluis scholar Lionel Carley, President of The Delius Society and author of *Delius A Life In Letters*. £40
- 14. **BRENDAN BEHAN**. *Brendan Behan's Island*. *An Irish Sketchbook*. With drawings by Paul Hogarth. Hutchinson 1962. First edition. Tall 8vo. 191pp. Top- and fore edge spotted, and with a small bump to the tips of two corners. A very good copy in slightly creased and toned dust wrapper. £15

- 15. **ARNOLD BENNETT**. Books and Persons. Being Comments on a Past Epoch 1908-1911. Chatto & Windus 1917. First edition. This copy **signed by the author** on the front free endpaper. 8vo. xii, 336pp. Cloth with a paper spine label. The tips of two corners gently bumped, the cloth faded at the backstrip, and the spine label slightly toned and chipped with the lettering very slightly defective. Some spotting to the fore edge and to very occasional margins. A light but lengthy vertical crease to the front free endpaper. A nice bright copy. No dust wrapper. A two-page preface by the author precedes essays on Joseph Conrad, W.W.Jacobs, H.G.Wells, Swinburne, Kipling, C.E.Montague, Henry James, W.H.Hudson, John Masefield and over fifty other subjects, all collected from his contribution to weekly magazine New Age. £50
- 16. **JOHN BERRYMAN.** *Poems*. New Directions, 'The Poet of the Month' series, Connecticut 1942. First edition of the author's first solo-authored book, of which 2,000 copies were printed, this being one of 1,500 examples bound in wrappers. Slim 8vo. 25pp + i publisher's advertisement. Stapled wrappers. A fine copy in dust wrapper, lightly toned at the spine. A brief verse dedication precedes eleven poems, three of them here making their first appearance in print. £50
- 17. **JOHN BERRYMAN**. His Toy, His Dream, His Rest. 308 Dream Songs. Faber 1969. First UK edition. 8vo. xxi, 317pp. A fine copy in very good dust wrapper, slightly chafed at the spine panel ends and corner tips and with a trace of light dust soiling. The continuation and conclusion to his celebrated 77 Dream Songs sequence, winner of the National Book Award for Poetry and the Bollingen Prize. £50
- 18. **JOHN BERRYMAN**. Love & Fame. Poems. Faber 1971. First UK edition. Slim 8vo. 96pp. A fine copy in virtually fine dust wrapper, with a trace of dust soiling to the predominantly white rear panel. Fifty-three poems followed by a two-page prose Afterword. £30
- 19. **JOHN BERRYMAN**. *Delusions, Etc.* Poems. Faber 1972. First UK edition. Slim 8vo. x, 70pp. A fine copy in very good dust wrapper, lightly chafed at the head of the spine panel and with just a trace of dust soiling. Forty-three poems, his posthumously published final collection. £25
- 20. **JOHN BETJEMAN** contributes his six-page article *Shakespeare on the Screen* to the anthology *Press Gang! Crazy World Chronicle*. Edited with an introductory note by Leonard Russell and with illustrations and a dust wrapper design by Nicolas Bentley. Hutchinson 1937. First edition. 8vo. xv, 300pp. Buckram. The scattering of light spotting to the fore edge, and some further light spotting and a little partial toning to the free endpapers. A very good copy in the quite uncommon dust wrapper, price-clipped and somewhat toned, chafed, rubbed and edge-worn. An amusing parody of 1930s journalism, issued as a companion volume to Russell's *Parody Party* (1936), this time with contributors including Betjeman, Hilaire Belloc, Cyril Connolly, E.M.Delafield, Ronald Knox, D.B.Wyndham Lewis, Peter Quennell, and others. £40
- 21. **JOHN BETJEMAN. Joan Hassall**. *The English Scene. A Reader's Guide*. With a reading list compiled by L.Russell Muirhead. Published for The National Book League by the Cambridge University Press 1951. First edition. Slim 8vo. 16pp + [iv] advertisements. Stapled wrappers, fractionally dust soiled and with a narrow strip of light vertical toning to the front wrapper. With two small wood-engraved decorations by Joan Hassall. A very good copy of this curiously elusive Betjeman item. £50
- 22. **JOHN BETJEMAN.** Ah Middlesex. A keepsake from the 1984 exhibition John Betjeman A Celebration, centred around Ray Carter's collection of Betjeman first editions. Illustrated with six Fougasse drawings. Warren Editions 1984. First edition, designed by Jonathan Gili and limited to 250 copies. Landscape 12mo. Unpaginated. Sewn card wrappers with an integral patterned paper dust wrapper. In fine state. The text and illustrations are reprinted from an April 1954 issue of Punch. Uncommon. £50

- 23. WILLIAM BLAKE. Mona Wilson. The Life of William Blake. Peter Davies Ltd., 1932. First trade edition. 8vo. 324pp. Buckram. Frontispiece. The top edge dust soiled, a narrow strip of partial toning to the free endpapers, and a little spotting to three or four preliminary leaves. Very good in the quite uncommon dust wrapper, which is price-clipped, lightly toned, and chipped at the spine panel ends with some internal reinforcement. £20
- 24. **BRIAN BLESSED**. *Blessed Everest*. Salamander Books 1995. First edition. This copy **signed by the author** on the title page. 4to. 160pp. Illustrated with scores and scores of photographs, primarily in colour. A virtually fine copy in fractionally marked and rubbed price-clipped dust wrapper. The author's history and travelogue of Everest (Blessed attempted Everest on several occasions; preferring not to use supplemental oxygen he reached heights of 28,200 feet in 1993 and 25,200 feet in 1996, but did not summit). Gordon's Alive! £25
- 25. **KAREN BLIXEN**. On Mottoes of My Life. With a seven-page preface by Eigil Balling. Presentation Books, Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Copenhagen 1962. First edition. Slim 8vo. 32pp. With pictorial endpapers, a photographic portrait frontispiece, seven captioned photographs and one sketch by the author. Contemporary former owner name and date inked to the head of a blank preliminary leaf. A fine copy of this transcript of the author's 1959 speech before the American Academy of Arts and Letters, here published posthumously, three months after her death. No dust wrapper called-for. Blixen, as 'Isak Dinesen', was elected honorary member of the American Academy of Arts and Letters and the National Institute of Arts and Letters in 1957. Uncommon. £50
- 26. **LAWRENCE BLOCK**. The Burglar in the Library. No Exit Press, Harpenden 1997. First edition, preceding the US edition [this being the uncorrected first state, with the required error on the first text leaf: "settle" instead of "settled"]. This copy **signed by the author** on the title page. 8vo. A trace of bruising to the backstrip ends, else a fine copy in slightly rubbed and creased dust wrapper. The eighth volume in his Bernie Rhodenbarr 'gentleman burglar' series. £35
- 27. **ROBERTO BOLAÑO.** The Savage Detectives. A novel. Translated from the Spanish of Los Detectives Salvajes by Natasha Wimmer. Picador 2007. First UK edition. 8vo. 577pp. A trace of toning to the leaf margins, else a fine copy in price-clipped dust wrapper with a single short closed tear to the base of the front panel and the tiniest hint of occasional edgewear. A super copy of the Chilean author's award-winning novel detailing the search for a 1920s Mexican poet by two 1970s poets of the 'Visceral Realism' school. £20
- 28. **WILLIAM BOYD**. An Ice Cream War. A novel. Hamish Hamilton 1982. First edition. This copy **signed by the author** on the title page. 8vo. 370pp. Some spotting to the edges and endpapers, encroaching just a fraction to the extreme margins of very occasional text leaves. Backstrip ends gently bruised. An almost very good copy in dust wrapper, with some spotting to the flaps and some fading to the red spine panel colouring. The author's second novel. £55
- 29. **WILLIAM BOYD**. On the Yankee Station. Stories. William Morrow & Co., New York 1984. The first US edition. This copy **signed by the author** at the base of the title page. 8vo. 217pp. Quarter cloth. Edges spotted, and with a tiny trace of further spotting to the half-title and title page. A very good copy in very good dust wrapper. The American edition of the author's second book and first collection of short fiction, comprising fifteen stories (two of which did not appear in the equivalent UK edition which was published several years earlier). £60
- 30. **WILLIAM BOYD**. *Stars and Bars*. A novel. Hamish Hamilton 1984. First edition. This copy **signed by the author** on the title page. 8vo. 255pp. Edges spotted, and with some toning to the lesser-quality paperstock. A good bright copy in price-clipped dust wrapper, with some fading to the spine panel and a little spotting to the flaps. The author's third novel. £25

- 31. **WILLIAM BOYD**. *The New Confessions*. A novel. Hamish Hamilton 1987. First edition. This copy **signed by the author** on the title page. 8vo. 462pp. A tiny trace of spotting to the top edge, and some toning to the lesser quality paperstock, as is invariably the case. A very good copy in just fractionally toned dust wrapper. £35
- 32. **WILLIAM BOYD**. *The Blue Afternoon*. A novel. Sinclair-Stevenson, 1993. First edition. This copy **signed by the author** on the title-page. 8vo. 324pp. Top edge spotted. Very good indeed in dust wrapper, with some fading to the spine panel. £15
- 33. WILLIAM BOYD. Armadillo. A novel. Hamish Hamilton 1998. First edition. This copy signed by the author on the title page. 8vo. Top edge lightly spotted, else a fine copy in very good dust wrapper, with a little light creasing to the upper and lower edges of the front panel. £15
- 34. **WILLIAM BOYD**. *The Destiny of Nathalie 'X'*. Stories. Sinclair-Stevenson 1995. First edition. This copy **signed by the author** on the title page. 8vo. 195pp. Some spotting to the top- and fore edge, encroaching to the margins of the text leaves. A good bright copy in dust wrapper, with some spine panel fading. Nine stories, the author's second collection of short fiction. £20
- 35. **JOHN BOWEN**. *The Birdcage*. A novel. Faber 1962. First edition. A presentation copy, **inscribed by the author** on the front free endpaper to Martyn Goff, critic and chairman of the Booker Prize advisory committee, and dated the year of publication. 8vo. Top edge lightly spotted, a trace of dust soiling to the cloth, and the boards lifting a fraction. A very good copy in very good dust wrapper, just fractionally toned at the spine panel. His fifth adult novel. £50
- 36. MALCOLM BRADBURY. *The History Man.* A novel. Secker & Warburg 1975. First edition. 8vo. 230pp. A little light spotting to the top- and fore edge, and the binding just a little sprung. Very good in dust wrapper, with a little wear, chafing, and surface abrasion to the spine panel ends. A more than respectable copy of the author's best known novel, a satire of academic life which takes place over a term at the University of Leeds. £15
- 37. **CHRISTINE BROOKE-ROSE**. The Dear Deceit. A novel. Secker & Warburg 1960. First edition. 8vo. 319pp. Edges lightly spotted, and with just a hint of toning to the free endpapers, and a trace of spotting to the half-title and title page. A very good copy in price-clipped dust wrapper featuring a handsome design by Robin Ray, a little soiled and toned at the rear panel, and with some wear to the spine ends and corner tips with several tiny fractions of loss. The author's somewhat experimental third novel, mostly told in reverse-chronological order. Uncommon. £200
- 38. **JOCELYN BROOKE** (writing as 'Bernard J.Brooke') contributes two poems to the anthology *Bedales Poetry. An Anthology of Verse Written by Boys and Girls at Bedales School.* Edited with an introductory note by Geoffrey H.Crump. Beadles 1927. First edition. 8vo. vii, 81pp. Cloth-backed paper-covered boards. The backstrip cloth faded, and the boards a little toned and soiled. Free endpapers lightly toned and spotted, and with a touch of further mostly marginal spotting to occasional leaves. A nice bright copy. Brooke contributes his poems *Spindleberries* and *Villanelle of the Flower of the Shore*, which he penned at the age of seventeen and eighteen respectively. Other contributors include the artist Gavin Bone (seven poems), English revivalist Rolf Gardiner (three poems), and Laurence Collier, later Sir Laurence Collier, British Ambassador to Norway (three poems including *The Rubaiyat of Bedales*). Uncommon. £75
- 39. **RUPERT BROOKE**. **F.T.Prince**. *Afterword on Rupert Brooke*. The Menard Press 1976. First edition. Slim 8vo. 16pp stapled into plain card wrappers. A single miniscule blemish to a single text leaf, else a fine copy in dust wrapper, a little faded at the spine. A six-part poem which attempts "to interpret the evidence" of Brooke's life. £10

- 40. **GEORGE MACKAY BROWN**. *Two Poems for Kenna*. Words Press, 'Mir Poets' series, Dorset 1988. First edition, limited to 200 numbered copies, this being one of 75 examples **signed by the author**. Slim 8vo. [8]pp stapled into card wrappers. A virtually fine copy. Mackay Brown's poems *A Writer's Day* [written in November 1986] and *The Prince in the Heather* [written in February 1987] appear in this first number of Julian Nangle's Mir Poets series. £75
- 41. **GEORGE MACKAY BROWN. Maggie Fergusson.** George Mackay Brown. The Life. John Murray 2006. First edition. A presentation copy, **inscribed by the author** on the title page. 8vo. xiv, 363pp. Illustrated with a map and 18 photographs. A sliver of moisture marking to the base of the rear endpaper and to the adjacent index leaves. Very good indeed in fractionally dust soiled dust wrapper. The definitive biography of the celebrated Orcadian poet, novelist and short story writer (Fergusson was the only biographer to whom Mackay Brown gave his blessing). £60
- 42. **PAUL CELAN**. Selected Poems and Prose of Paul Celan. Translated from the German by John Felstiner. W.W.Norton, New York 2001. First edition. 8vo. xxxvi, 426pp. Paper-covered boards. A touch of bruising to the backstrip ends, else a fine copy in very good dust wrapper, with a little corresponding creasing to the spine panel ends. A 16-page introduction by the translator precedes 161 poems and four prose pieces, all presented in English and the original German, plus indices of titles and first lines in both languages. The most complete edition of the celebrated Romanian writer's work, including a number of hitherto unprinted poems found after his death, and some hitherto unprinted juvenile pieces. Not published in the UK. £35
- 43. **FRANCIS CARCO**. [Ford Madox Ford / Jean Rhys interest]. Perversity. A novel. Translated from the French of Perversité by Ford Madox Ford [i.e. Jean Rhys]. Pascal Covici, Chicago 1928. The first English-language edition. 8vo. 278pp. The cloth very lightly marked in two or three places. A little light wear to the backstrip ends, and the binding cracked and splitting at the half-title, and again at the rear hinge. A good copy. No dust wrapper. This English translation is misattributed to Ford Madox Ford, whereas in fact it was the work of his then-lover Jean Rhys. The exact circumstances and motivations surrounding this error remain somewhat murky, but Ford did confess in a letter to Edward Naumburg Jr. that "the translation was not by me at all", attributing it to Rhys and claiming to have had the edition "suppressed", and yet paperback editions from both 1950 and 1956 re-state the false translation claim. - 44. **ANGELA CARTER**. *Heroes & Villains*. Heinemann 1969. First edition. 8vo. 214pp + [i] reviews of her previous publications. A scathing picture of army life and one of the most vivid accounts of daily life in the trenches, which also serves as a poignant tribute to a lost generation of soldiers. Most uncommon.
