## **CLEARWATER BOOKS**

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I no longer number them, but this is the 150<sup>th</sup> Clearwater catalogue. A rough estimate makes that an offering of perhaps 45,000 individual books. Some of those remain languishing on my shelves; others have come back in and gone back out again – and a few have repeated this cycle several times.

Twice just last month I spotted books on third party shelves with a pencilled 'SFC' on the front endpaper identifying them as once offered by Clearwater. Of course I often encounter books bearing the notations of other departed colleagues – Eric Stevens notes are easy to spot, Peter Jolliffe's too. This very catalogue includes several items once offered by Joan Stevens. Dear old Gerry Mosdell passed away earlier this year; I don't think I currently have anything from his shelves, but it won't be long before something turns up.

The seeming significance of this being the 150<sup>th</sup> catalogue, together with thoughts of Gerry and other absent friends tempted me to use this space to pen a reminiscence of the Hotel Russell 'dining club' which accompanied the monthly London PBFA fairs. I was but a nipper back then, but I had envisaged an amusing nostalgic piece detailing hours of cribbage of a varying standard, camp-stove-cooked meals of an altogether higher standard, and impromptu cricket matches between the stacks with improvised equipment...but time remains my enemy, so all you get is this mere hint of those longgone evenings of food, conversation, and oh-so much laughter.

- 1. **BRIAN ALDISS**. *The Malacia Tapestry*. A novel. Jonathan Cape 1976. First edition. 8vo. 313pp. Very good indeed in dust wrapper, very lightly rubbed at the head of the spine panel. £20
- 2. **ANTHOLOGY.** The Knapsack. A Pocket-Book of Prose and Verse. Edited with a three-page preface by Herbert Read. George Routledge 1939. First edition. 8vo. x, 622pp. The uncommon troop binding in folding brown cloth with a snap clasp. A touch of wear to the extremities, and the binding a little tender at two unprinted rear flyleaves. A very good copy. A wide-ranging anthology of verse and prose produced for overseas soldiers during WWII uncommon in this original binding which is designed to preserve the text against the rigours of military life. Includes works by George Borrow, Emily Brontë, T.S.Eliot, Thomas Hardy, William Hazlitt, David Jones (a seven-page extract from In Parentheses), T.E.Lawrence (his twelve-page Arab Bulletin #106 The Destruction of the Fourth Turkish Army), Frederick Manning, John Masefield, Wilfred Owen, H.M.Tomlinson, W.B.Yeats &c., &c., &c., &c., &c.
- 3. **ANTHOLOGY.** Choice. Some New Stories and Prose. Edited by William Sansom and with illustrations by Leonard Rosoman. Progress Publishing 1946. First edition. 8vo. viii, 191pp. Former owner gift inscription inked to the front free endpaper, alongside inkstamped former owner address details. A very good copy in the Rosoman-designed dust wrapper, which is a little dust soiled, lightly rubbed at several extremities and somewhat excessively price-clipped. An anthology of mostly original prose including contributions by Anna Kavan, Elizabeth Bowen, William Plomer, Sidney Keyes, John Sommerfield, Frank O'Connor, Arthur Waley, Hugh Massingham, P.H.Newby, the editor, and others (Sidney Keyes' contribution is the only one to have been previously printed). £30
- 4. **ANTHOLOGY.** New Directions in Prose and Poetry. Number Eleven. Edited by Jams Laughlin. James Laughlin / New Directions, New York 1949. First edition. 8vo. 512pp + [iv] plates of Arthur G.Dove reproductions. A tiny scuff to the head of the upper board, and some light tape residue marking to the free endpapers. A very good copy in lightly rubbed and chafed dust wrapper, with several tiny fractions of edge-loss. Includes contributions by Stephen Spender, Lorine Niedecker, Henry Miller, Paul Bowles, William Goyen, Brenda Chamberlain, William Carlos Williamson, Tennessee Williams, Jorge Luis Borges, Jean Genet and others. £25
- 5. **ANTHOLOGY**. Aiding and Abetting. An Alphabet for Aids. Libanus Press 1991. The deluxe issue, limited to just 30 copies printed on Velin Arches rag paper and bound in half black morocco with paper-covered sides, housed in a cloth-covered clamshell presentation case (from a total edition of 385 copies). 8vo. Unpaginated. With a title page decoration by Posy Simmonds and twenty-six original hand-water-coloured illustrations, plus hand-coloured decorative initials, contributed by Colin Barnes, John Montgomery, Chris Brown, Susan Curtis, Ian Beck, Pierre Letan, Nicola Bayley, Laura Wooley, Patrick Thomas and others (a total of thirty-one individual artists). In fine state. Pre-publication prospectus laid-in, alongside a signed type-written letter from Bertram Rota's John Byrne, who conceived and edited the project, contributes a *Note* and the individual alphabetized words. All of the artwork was donated free of charge, and the entire proceeds were donated on the London Lighthouse HIV hospice. £350
- 6. **SIMON ARMITAGE**. *Xanadu*. Poems. Bloodaxe Books, Newcastle upon Tyne 1992. First edition. Slim 8vo. 64pp. Glossy card wrappers. A virtually fine copy. The author's second collection of verse, a 'poem film for television' which was broadcast on BBC2 in June 1992 two months after this bookform appearance. £10
- 7. **SIMON ARMITAGE**. *Little Green Man*. A novel. Viking 2001. First edition. This copy **signed by the author** by way of the signed sticker pasted to the title page. 8vo. 246pp. A touch of light toning to the leaf margins, else a fine copy in fine dust wrapper. The author's first novel. £15

- 8. **SIMON ARMITAGE**. *Black Roses. The Killing of Sophie Lancaster*. A poem. Pomona Books 2012. First edition a paperback original. Slim 8vo. Card wrappers. A tiny crease to the lower corner of the rear wrapper, else a fine copy. Shortlisted for the Ted Hughes Poetry Award. £25
- 9. **C.T.ATKINSON.** The South Wales Borderers 24<sup>th</sup> Foot 1689-1937. Printed for The Regimental History Committee at the University Press, Cambridge 1937. First edition in the deluxe binding of full green morocco with bevelled edges. 4to. xxii, 601pp. Top edge gilt. Map-illustrated front endpapers, and a movements chart printed to the rear endpapers. With a tissue-protected frontispiece, scores of plates and illustrations in the text, including a few in colour with tissue protectors where required, and four multi-panel folding maps at the rear. A little light scoring to the cloth. A very good copy of this beautifully produced comprehensive regimental history, with particular emphasis on the 1879 Zulu uprising and the defence of Rourke's Driff. £150
- 10. **W.H.AUDEN. Richard Hoggart**. *Auden. An Introductory Essay*. Chatto & Windus 1951. First edition. 8vo. 256pp. Portrait frontispiece. A review copy, with the publisher's folded review slip laid-in. Free endpapers toned and spotted. Very good indeed in dust wrapper, lightly toned at the spine panel, with a touch of edgewear and a tiny nick. The author's first book, and the first full-length stuffy of Auden's work, published whilst he was still a staff tutor at Hull University. £25
- 11. **W.H.AUDEN**. *The Dyer's Hand and Other Essays*. Faber 1963. First UK edition, issued a year after the American edition, and including a few corrections from that earlier issue. 8vo. vii, 527pp. Some quite light toning to the endpapers. A very good copy in very good price-clipped dust wrapper, lightly toned at the spine panel and with a touch of wear and several tiny slivers of extremity loss. Thirty-four essays, assembled, edited and arranged by the author, with subjects including Robert Frost, D.H.Lawrence, Marianne Moore, and American Poetry. A45b. £65
- 12. **PAUL AUSTER.** Burning Boy. The Life and Work of Stephen Crane. Faber 2021. First UK edition. 8vo. 783pp. A virtually fine copy in dust wrapper, with a single tiny closed tear. £25
- 13. **AVIATION. J.M.Bruce.** *British Aeroplanes 1914-18*. Putnam 1957. First edition. 4to. viii, 742pp. Illustrated with 645 photographs, and a few plans. The tip of one corner gently knocked, and the binding slightly shaken. A very good copy, lacking the dust wrapper but housed in the original stiff card slipcase, which is a little rubbed and worn at the margins. An exhaustive study of British aeroplanes designed and/or used during the Great War. £100
- 14. **AVIATION. Francis K.Mason**. Battle Over Britain. A History of the German Air Assaults on Great Britain 1917-18 and July-December 1940, and of the Development of Britain's Air Defences Between the World Wars. Aston Publications, Bucks 1990. A new edition of Mason's 1969 publication, this being **one of 100 numbered copies** for The Royal Air Force Museum, with a pasted plate to the front free endpaper noting the limitation and **signed by the author**, alongside the signatures of ten active combatants. 4to. 539pp. With scores and scores of black and white photographs, plus a few maps. A virtually fine copy in price-clipped dust wrapper, with some fading to the publisher's red spine panel colouring. An exhaustive companion to the Battle of Britain and various Great War dogfights. £250
- 15. **AVIATION. K.A.Merrick**. The Handley Page Halifax. Aston Publications, Bucks 1990. First edition, this being **one of 100 numbered copies** for The Royal Air Force Museum, with a pasted plate to the front free endpaper noting the limitation and **signed by the author** alongside the signatures of nine active combatants (a space is reserved for a tenth signature but no penmanship has been added). 4to. 232pp. With photographic endpapers, and nearly 250 black and white photographs, plus several more in colour. A fine copy in dust wrapper, with a touch of fading to the publisher's red spine panel lettering. A comprehensive account of the development and operational history of the Halifax bomber. £125

- 16. **B.B.** / **D.J.WATKINS-PITCHFORD.** The Sportsman's Bedside Book. Written by 'B.B.' with five drawings by G.D.Armour, and seven etchings and tailpieces by D.J.Watkins-Pitchford. Eyre & Spottiswoode 1937. First edition. 8vo. xii, 237pp. Quarter cloth. A little minor damp-staining to the cloth at the head of the spine and boards. The edges lightly spotted, and with some further spotting to the margins of four or five preliminary and concluding leaves. Contemporary former owner gift inscription and bookplate to the front free endpaper. A good bright copy in somewhat nicked, toned, torn and chipped price-clipped dust wrapper. The author's first book, written whilst he was still assistant art master at Rugby School. Uncommon in the dust wrapper, although this is certainly not the best-preserved example. £125
- 17. **B.B.** / **DENYS WATKINS-PITCHFORD**. Letters from Compton Deverell. Eyre & Spottiswoode 1950. First edition in the second state binding of green boards with black lettering. 8vo. 281pp. With colour map-illustrated endpapers, a frontispiece, nine plates and various cheaper header and footer illustrations and vignettes. A short crease to the lower corner of half-adozen adjacent text leaves, and just a trace of spotting to the half-title and to one unprinted concluding leaf. A very good copy in price-clipped and slightly rubbed, chafed, soiled and stained pictorial second state dust wrapper. £25
- 18. **H.E.BATES.** A German Idyll. With wood engravings by Lynton Lamb. The Golden Cockerel Press, Waltham St. Lawrence 1932. First edition, printed by Robert and Moira Gibbings on handmade paper, and limited to 307 numbered copies **signed by the author** (this being #154). Tall slim 8vo. 40pp. Morocco-backed boards with decorated paper sides. Top edge gilt. With a frontispiece, title page decorations, and nine delightful wood-engraved header pieces and decorations. Backstrip ends gently worn. A very good copy, in fine state internally. No dust wrapper called for, but lacking the original unprinted glassine protector. The first appearance in print of this Bates' story. Eads A16. £200
- 19. **BERYL BAINBRIDGE**. *The Birthday Boys*. Duckworth 1991. First edition. This copy fondly **inscribed by the author** on the title-page to Derwent [May, literary editor of *The Listener* and the *TLS*) and his wife, Yola (i.e. Yolanta). 8vo. 189pp. A fine copy in virtually fine dust wrapper, marred only by a narrow sliver of discolouration to the lower edge. A highly readable fictionalised account of Captain Scott's ill-fated Antarctic expedition, arranged into five first-person narratives. £50
- 20. **SEBASTIAN BARKER**. O Mother Heal Your Son. A poem. Martin Brian & O'Keeffe 1986. First edition, limited to 100 numbered copies **signed by the author** (this being #74 and additionally **inscribed** by Barker at the head of the title page, the inscription dated two years after publication). Slim 8vo. Unpaginated [8 pages of printed text]. Stapled card wrappers. A virtually fine copy. Uncommon. £30
- 21. **THE BEATLES. Alan Aldridge.** *The Beatles Illustrated Lyrics.* Edited with a two-page introduction by Alan Aldridge. Macdonald 1969. First edition. 4to. 136pp. Decorated card wrappers (this first edition was not issued in the UK in casebound format). The wrappers a little toned and dust soiled, and with a little toning to the paperstock. Lavishly illustrated in colour and monochrome throughout and including illustrations by David Bailey, Mel Calman, Erté, David Hockney, Art Kane, Ronald Searle, Tomi Ungerer and over thirty others. A very good copy of this splendidly illustrated companion to and interpretation of Beatles lyrics. £35
- 22. **MAX BEERBOHM**. Rossetti and His Circle. William Heinemann 1922. First edition. Royal 8vo. ix + a frontispiece and twenty-two plates of colour caricatures mounted on the versos, each with a captioned tissue-guard. A touch of bruising to the backstrip ends. Some partial toning to the free endpapers, and some spotting to a dozen preliminary leaves, which impacts none of the plates. A very good copy in the uncommon dust wrapper, which is toned at the spine panel with several tiny slivers of edge-loss but remains very good. Gallatin & Oliver 18. £125

- 23. **ANTONY BEEVOR**. *Berlin. The Downfall 1945*. Viking 2002. First edition. 8vo. xxxvii, 490pp. With 16 maps and nearly 50 photographs. A fine copy in very good dust wrapper, lightly toned at the spine panel. The author's celebrated narrative history of the Battle of Berlin. £20
- 24. **E.F.BENSON.** *Queen Lucia*. Hutchinson [1920]. First edition. 8vo. 304pp. The cloth faded at the backstrip with a single tiny area of toning, and with a little further fading to the margins of the upper and lower boards. Some bruising to the backstrip ends, and some knocking to the corner tips and to one or two other extremities. The binding just a fraction tender at the half-title. Rear endpaper browned, and just a faint trace of erased former owner notation to the front free endpaper. A tiny nick and accompanying crease to the fore edge margin of four adjacent text leaves. A fair copy, really quite crisp internally. The first of the author's sequence of *Mapp and Lucia* novels. Uncommon. £95
- 25. **E.F.BENSON.** *Miss Mapp*. Hutchinson [1922]. First edition. 8vo. 288pp + xl catalogue at the rear. Some nicking and light wear to the backstrip ends, a trace of bruising to the corner tips, and a two-inch slit to the lower outer gutter. Free endpapers browned. The binding cracked but sound at several gatherings. Faint trace of erased former owner notations to the front free endpaper. A good copy, really quite crisp internally. The second of the *Mapp and Lucia* novels. £75
- 26. **E.F.BENSON.** Lucia in London. Hutchinson 1927. First edition. 8vo. 288pp. The backstrip ends and corner tips gently rubbed, and with three or four tiny areas of light miscellaneous marking to the boards. A former owner inscription has been partially erased from the front free endpaper, resulting in a little surface damage to the paperstock and a single tiny area of enclosed loss. Crayoned 's' to the front and rear pastedowns. A good copy, really quite crisp internally. The third of the *Mapp and Lucia* novels. £60
- 27. **E.F.BENSON.** *Lucia's Progress*. Hodder & Stoughton 1935. First edition. 8vo. 312pp. In a W.H.Smith library binding of green cloth with the Smith's logo black-stamped to the base of the upper board. The cloth quite faded at the backstrip and with a thin sliver of further fading to one margin of the rear board. A little bruising and wear to the spine ends and corner tips. A hint of tenderness to the titlepage and a little further tenderness to a single gathering of four text leaves. A fair copy. The fifth of the *Mapp and Lucia* novels. £40
  - 28. **JOHN BETJEMAN** contributes a one-page appreciation of artist and architect M.H.Baillie Scott to an issue of periodical *The Studio*. Vol. 130, no. 628, July 1945. Edited by Geoffrey Holme. Small 4to. 32pp + [viii index and advertisements]. Card wrappers, very lightly dust soiled and with a single tiny area of surface abrasion to the front wrapper. A very good copy. £15
- 29. **JOHN BETJEMAN** contributes an eight-page article *On Looking at Houses* to the anthology *House & Garden Weekend Book*. Edited by Elisabeth Brayne. Condé Nast Publications 1969. First edition. Small 4to. 272pp. With Gordon Davies colour endpaper decorations, and various illustrations throughout contributed by Nicholas Bentley Felix Kelly, Leonard Rosoman, David Gentleman, and others. Top edge lightly spotted, and the tip of one corner gently knocked. A very good copy in rubbed, soiled and somewhat sunned price-clipped dust wrapper. Other contributors include Ian Fleming, Aldous Huxley, Paul Hogarth, Robert Graves, and Ann Fleming. £50
- 30. **JOHN BETJEMAN. Dr. G.Krishnamurti.** The Eighteen-Nineties: A Literary Exhibition. The Francis Thompson Society and The National Book League 1974. First edition. 8vo. 204pp. Card wrappers, a little spotted and soiled. A small area of blemishing to the head of the title page, and the title inked to the unprinted spine. A bright copy. **Together with** The Eighteen-Nineties. Supplement to the Catalogue. With a foreword by John Betjeman. The Francis Thompson Society and The Enitharmon Press 1974. With a **presentation inscription** from Alan [Clodd, founder of the Enitharmon Press] to the head of the title page. Slim 8vo. 24pp sewn into card wrappers. A fine copy. Folding four-page errata and corrigenda to the main catalogue laid-in, as issued. £35

- 31. **JOHN BETJEMAN**. *Eternity*. [a Christmas card]. [no publisher / no date]. A Christmas card, **inscribed** "best wishes for Christmas, John Betjeman". A single sheet of pink card measuring 25cm x 10cm, with the word "Eternity" printed in large black lettering across the centre. Folded once, presumably for enveloping. A few racing tips have been inked on the reverse. A very good copy on an uncommon item (the first Betjeman-inscribed Christmas card we have handled). £200
- 32. **CHRIS BONINGTON**. Everest. The Hard Way. Hodder & Stoughton 1976. First edition. This copy **signed by the author** on the title page. 4to. 239pp. With photographic endpapers, a colour frontispiece, and scores of colour and black and white photographs throughout including full-page and double-spread presentations, plus various maps in the text. Trace of partially erased former owner pencilled details to the tip of the front free endpaper. A virtually fine copy in virtually fine dust wrapper. An account of the 1975 British Mount Everest Southwest Face expedition. £100
- 33. **JORGE LUIS BORGES**. *In Praise of Darkness*. Poems. Translated from the Spanish of *Elagio de la Sombra* by Norman Thomas di Giovanni. Allen Lane 1975. First UK edition. 8vo. 142pp. Neat former owner inkstamp to the front free endpaper. A virtually fine copy in just fractionally rubbed and lifting dust wrapper. A three-page preface by the author precedes thirty-six poems, presented in both English and the original Spanish. The author's first new volume of verse since 1960 and his first since the later 1920s written with book-publication in mind. £50
- 34. **ELIZABETH BOWEN**. *The Demon Lover and Other Stories*. Jonathan Cape 1945. First edition. 8vo. 189pp. Top edge lightly dust soiled, and with a hint of spotting to the top- and fore edge and to the free endpapers. Tiny dealer plate to the front pastedown. Very good indeed in dust wrapper, a little rubbed, chafed and slightly dusty, with several tiny fractions of loss from the spine ends and corner tips. Twelve stories, the author's sixth collection of short fiction. £125
- 35. **C.J.BOX**. *The Bitterroots*. A novel. Minotaur Books, New York 2019. First edition. This copy **signed by the author** on the front endpaper. 8vo. 314pp. Very good indeed in fine dust wrapper. This is the exclusive Barnes & Novel edition, which includes a three-page essay by the author which does not appear in other edition. The fifth of his Cody Hoyt / Cassie Dewell nooks. £35
- 36. **MALCOLM BRADBURY**. *The Modern American Novel*. Oxford University Press, Oxford 1983. First edition. 8vo. viii, 209pp. Very good indeed in dust wrapper, lightly faded at the spine panel and with a light scattering of internal spotting. Poet Gavin Selerie's copy, with his signature neatly inked to the front free endpaper. £20
- 37. **RAY BRADBURY**. *Green Shadows, White Whale*. A novel. HarperCollins 1992. First UK edition. 8vo. 266pp. Former owner gift inscription neatly inked to the tip of the front free endpaper, else a fine copy in very good dust wrapper, marred only by a touch of scoring and a series of tiny indentations to the rear panel. A fictionalised account of the author's 1953-54 journey to Ireland with John Huston to write a screen adaptation of *Moby Dick*. £10
- 38. RUPERT BROOKE contributes five poems including *The Old Vicarage, Grantchester* (the first bookform appearance of this poem) to the anthology *Georgian Poetry 1911-1912*. Edited with a brief preparatory note by E[dward] M[arsh]. The Poetry Bookshop [1912]. First edition. 8vo. 197pp. Paper-covered boards. Top edge gilt, others untrimmed. Spine ends and corner tips gently rubbed, the backstrip toned, and with some splitting and tenderness to the outer gutters. Free endpapers lightly toned and with some light fox spotting throughout. Contemporary presentation inscription inked to the front free endpaper. A good, bright copy of the first of Edward Marsh's influential anthology series. Brooke also contributes his poems *Dust, The Fish, Town and Country* and *Dining-room Tea*, all of which had originally appeared in his debut full-length collection *Poems 1911*. The other contributors include Lascelles Abercrombie, G.K.Chesterton, W.H.Davies, J.E.Flecker, W.W.Gibson, D.H.Lawrence, John Masefield, Harold Monro and T.Sturge Moore. Uncommon in the first edition state (of which 500 copies were printed). £125

- 39. **RUPERT BROOKE. Maurice Browne.** Recollections of Rupert Brooke. Alexander Greene, Chicago 1927. First edition, limited to 510 numbered copies on handmade paper printed at the Cuneo Press (this being #116). 4to. 64pp. Buckram with bevelled edges. Top edge gilt, others untrimmed. With a photographic portrait frontispiece, two further photographic plates and one manuscript reproduction. Boards lightly marked in places, and with some unsightly moisture marking to the lower edge of both boards, which also lightly impacts the free endpapers and pastedowns, but is otherwise all but invisible internally. A good copy, very crisp internally. No dust wrapper, possibly as issued. Includes some hitherto unpublished letters and verses. £75
- 40. **SHEILA BURNFORD**. *The Incredible Journey*. With illustrations by Carl Burger. Hodder & Stoughton 1961. First edition. 8vo. 119pp. With decorated endpapers, a frontispiece, and eleven captioned plates. A virtually fine copy in price-clipped dust wrapper, toned at the spine panel and with a touch of further toning to the margins of the front and rear panels, and several tiny fractions of loss from the spine ends and corner tips. A very nice copy of the author's most celebrated book, a children's story recounting the adventures of three pets who travel 300 miles through northwestern Ontario in search of their owners. £35
- 41. **ELIZABETH BUTLER**. From Sketch-Book and Diary. With illustrations by the author. Burns and Oates 1909. First edition. Small 4to. x, 177pp. Top edge gilt. With twenty-eight colour plates, each with a captioned protector, and a further twenty-one sketches in the text. A little darkening to the backstrip cloth, and a touch of wear to several extremities. Some spotting to several preliminary and concluding leaves. Beautifully scripted presentation inscription to the front free endpaper, the lettering in black and red, alongside a pasted black and white image and a small convent library inkstamp. Very good. No dust wrapper, possibly as issued. Delightfully illustrated extracts from the author's travel diary, recounting adventures in Kerry and County Mayo, Cairo, the Upper Nile, Alexandria, Cape Colony, Tuscany, Sienna, Perugia, Vesuvius, and Rome. Quite uncommon. £55

Elizabeth Butler (née Thompson) was a noted military artist who specialised in painting scenes from British campaigns and battles including the Crimean War and the Napoleonic Wars. She was the sister of Alice Meynell, to whom the book was dedicated.

- 42. **GEORGE BUTTERWORTH.** A Shropshire Lad. Rhapsody for Full Orchestra. Composed by George Butterworth. Novello & Company, London and produced for the 1913 Leeds Festival 1913. First edition. Tall 4to. 26pp. Lettered card wrappers with a partially perished cloth tape binding, which is split but just holding. The wrappers a little marked, chafed and soiled, with two light but lengthy creases to the rear wrapper. Neat former owner nameplate to the upper wrapper. A touch of toning and spotting to occasional leaf margins. A good if somewhat fragile copy of a most uncommon item: the author's second major work following Two English Idylls [for orchestra] (1910–11). George Butterworth (1885-1916) was one of the most promising English composers of his generation and, along with his friends Cecil Sharp and Ralph Vaughan Williams, an enthusiastic collector of folk songs. His output was fairly minor (he destroyed much unfinished work during the war), but his most celebrated works are the eleven settings he wrote to A.E.Housman's A Shropshire Lad. The present rhapsody serves as a postlude to these pieces, and was first performed on 2 October 1913 at the Leeds Festival, conducted by Arthur Nikisch. Butterworth was killed by a sniper during the Battle of the Somme in August 1916. His body was hastily buried in the side of the trench, and never knowingly recovered for formal reburial. £95

Binding cracked and a little tender at the half-title. Free endpapers and pastedowns toned and spotted. Subsequent owner inscription (dated 1936) to the front free endpaper. An account of Childers' experiences in the Boer War, written without any thought of publication. Whilst serving in H.A.C in South Africa Childers composed many long descriptive letters home to his sisters, which they subsequently edited into book-form with the help of family friend Elizabeth Thompson, the daughter of George Smith of the Smith, Elder publishing house. The proofs were waiting for Childers to approve when he returned from the war in October 1900, and the book was published in November 1900, selling in substantial numbers. Most uncommon – and this a quite fascinating association copy. £250

William Le Fanu was the son of Irish railway engineer William Richard and the nephew of Sheridan Le Fanu. He and Childers were at Trinity College together and, in early 1903, along with a third university friend A.H.Dennis, they partnered in the purchase of the yacht Seabeam, which replaced Childers's beloved Vixen (which had been the model for Dulcibella in The Riddle of the Sands). Later that summer the three owners spent a week sailing along the south coast of England, and later explored the islands and coastal towns around Denmark. Childers' 'Regular Belly Stretchers' must have been a common occurrence during these voyages.

The recipient of Gardiner's note and inscription was Alan Conway Smith, bookseller, chain smoker, software enthusiast, and 30s & 40s poetry scholar. Alan was one of my regular monthly cribbage opponents at the Russell Hotel bookfair 'after-party' (he always insisted upon 'Stockport Rules' but it's now too long ago for me to recall exactly what that required). He passed away in my bed (I was absent!) in 1993 having just completed the installation of his upgraded book-selling software on my late father's ancient PC. There was no manual for this upgrade outside of Alan's head, and that PC and its technologically inefficient user was the bane of my bloody life for the next decade.
